Natural Resist-Dye Easter Eggs

WHAT IS IT?

Dyeing Easter Eggs naturally, using onion skins to create a deep purple/red dye and plants to form a barrier to the dye. This results in rich coloured eggs with lighter patterns of leaves and flowers.

WHAT DO I NEED TO GET STARTED?

- Eggs
- Tights
- A Saucepan
- A selection of different leaves and flowers
- Onion skins at least 1 onion skin per egg. (I have only tried with red onions, but apparently it also works with white onions)
- A splash of red wine vinegar
- Boiling water- <u>ensure adult supervision</u>
- Scissors– ensure adult supervision









Different flowers and leaves create different patterns - try a variety!





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THE PROCESS

- 1. Prepare the saucepan with onion skins. As a rough guide, use the skin of 1 onion per egg. The more skins you have, the bolder the dye. Add a splash of red wine vinegar.
- 2. Cut off a section of the tights from the leg so you have a small tube 10cm or less will do. Tie a knot in one end.
- 3. Place your chosen plants on an egg. Think about the placement as this is how you create natural patterns.
- 4. Secure the plants in place by wrapping the egg in the tights tube and tying a knot in the other end. This is a slightly fiddly process, but once you have done the first one, you will get quicker! *Try to stretch the tights as much as possible to ensure the plants do not move during the dyeing process.*
- 5. Repeat this process for all of your eggs.
- 6. Bring the saucepan of onion skins and vinegar to the boil.
- 7. Once boiling, add the eggs. Simmer them for 20 minutes.
- Leave to cool.
- 9. Carefully take the eggs out of the water and cut the tights off the eggs. Remove the plants if they have stuck a little.
- 10. Run the eggs under water to ensure all the plants are off
 and voila! You should have some beautiful naturally
 dyed and patterned eggs.
